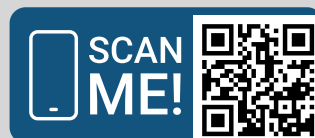

October 8 --11, 2025

The Institute participated in the second Africa in Transition Conference from October 8-11, 2025 at the University of Ghana. Professor Paulette A. Ramsay represented INAFRICARA and presented on “Africa in Transition: Fostering a Future of Innovation and Prosperity Driven by the Spirit of Global Africa.” The Conference featured many participants from The UWI community and diaspora. (The nature of her presentation is summarised below.)

October 15, 2025

The Institute hosted a scholarship presentation for the two UWI, Mona Campus students who were selected as beneficiaries of The PJ Patterson Scholarship in honour of The Statesman-in-Residence’s 90th birth anniversary. December 18, 2025

The Institute in Action continued

February 2026

On 4 February 2026, Sierra Leone's Minister of Tourism and Cultural Affairs, Nabeela Tunis, visited INAFRICARA with Professor Rosalea Hamilton, Sierra Leone's Honorary Consul to Jamaica and a Distinguished Scholar of INAFRICARA. The visit served two purposes: firstly, a meeting at the Office of the Statesman-in-Residence, The Most Honourable P. J. Patterson; and secondly, discussions on avenues for greater collaboration and cooperation, particularly in the areas of cultural expression and tourism.

January 28, 2026

Panel Discussion on "*Africa, Cuba and the Caribbean: Celebrating more than a Century of Co-operation and Collaboration*" - This activity was done in collaboration with The Embassy of Cuba and The Department of Modern Languages and Literature, UWI, Mona Campus in recognition of 100 years of regional and international cooperation between the regions. The panel featured former Deputy Principal of The UWI, Mona Campus, Mr. Joseph Pereira, Dr Karl Watts of the Department of History and Mr. Osvaldo Cardenas, Cuban national, former Lecturer, University of Havana.

February 25-28, 2026

Through the magnanimous sponsorship of The Africa Export Import Bank (AFREXIM) INAFRICARA partnered with the Jamaica Book Festival organisation, who initiated the event, to execute the inaugural Africa Caribbean Book Exchange for almost one week. The festival brought together writers, publishers, scholars, readers, students and literature aficionados for a celebration of Africa and Caribbean works. The festival took place at The UWI, Mona Campus, except for an outreach at Green Island High in Hanover on the 26th. More than a Century of Africa, Cuba and the Caribbean

In celebration of more than a century of cooperation between Cuba, the Caribbean and continental Africa, The Institute in partnership with the Cuban Embassy and The Department of Modern Languages and Literatures presented a panel discussion that took place at The Neville Hall Lecture Theatre, Faculty of Humanities and Education (FHE) on the 28th of January.

The topic that was discussed, “Africa, Cuba and the Caribbean: Celebrating More than a Century of Co-operation Collaboration” had Mr Osvaldo Cardenas, a Cuban national residing in Jamaica and former lecturer at Havana University who worked closely with the Cuban Government for decades, Mr. Joseph Pereira, former Deputy Principal, UWI Mona Campus, who developed programmes and courses that focused on Cuba and Latin America, as a former Lecturer and Dean (FHE), and Dr. Karl Watts, Lecturer in the Department of History and Archaeology.

In attendance were members of the Latin and Central American diplomatic corps, including the new Cuban Ambassador to Jamaica, H.E. Tania Lopez Larroque and many Cuban nationals residing in Jamaica. The proceedings were chaired by Professor Paulette A. Ramsay, Latin American scholar who directed the course of the discussions for close to two hours. Discussants primarily looked at the plethora of social, particularly educational and medical programmes that were developed out of the decades of cooperation and strengthening relations among Cuba, the wider Caribbean and continental Africa.

The entire proceedings were characterised of nostalgia as discussants and the audience looked back at the significant active role Cuba played in advancing co-operation in countries like Jamaica in the Caribbean, Angola, Mozambique and other African states. Cuban support was seen as very integral to the independence movements, particularly in African countries seeking to relinquish colonial shackles at the time. The celebrated Cuban revolutionary Fidel Castro was seen as the central political figure in the active years of forging cooperation and unity among countries and regions that have been exploited and oppressed by colonial Europe, whilst in a global environment hostile to Cuban politics.

Africa Caribbean Literary Exchange with JBF

Writers, scholars, publishers, and readers from across Africa and the Caribbean gathered at the University of the West Indies' Mona campus in Kingston, Jamaica, for the Africa Caribbean Book Festival, held February 25–28, 2026.

An initiative of the Jamaica Book Festival, the event explored the literary and cultural ties linking the two regions through readings, discussions, and workshops.

The **African Export-Import Bank** was the major sponsor of the Festival, whose sponsorship reflects growing recognition of the role culture and creative industries can play in strengthening Africa Caribbean relations. The event was also organised in collaboration with The PJ Patterson Institute for Africa Caribbean Advocacy, an institution dedicated to fostering engagement, cooperation, and shared development between the regions.

Throughout the Festival, audiences encountered a range of literary perspectives. Author readings, panel discussions, workshops, and smaller conversations gave writers the opportunity to discuss their work and the histories and cultural influences that shaped them.

Beyond the Festival Grounds

The festival's activities extended beyond the University Campus. As part of its outreach programme, organisers and participating writers visited Green Island High School in the parish of Hanover, where they led a literary session organised in partnership with a local literary group, The Hanover Writers Guild.

The visit brought the excitement of the festival directly to young readers. Students met with authors, listened to readings, and took part in discussions about storytelling, creativity, and the value of reading. Internationally Acclaimed Poet and Distinguished Author Professor Lorna Goodison visits The Institute

In December 2025 The PJ Patterson Institute for Africa Caribbean Advocacy (INAFRICARA) welcomed Professor Lorna Goodison, Jamaica's former Poet Laureate and internationally acclaimed poet, essayist and writer to a courtesy visit with The Most Honourable PJ Patterson, Startesman-in-Residence.

The visit was delightfully received, as Professor Goodison is a Distinguished Author of The Institute. As one of the Caribbean's finest literary giants, it was a pleasure and an honourable moment for The Institute to host Professor Goodison. She presented her latest literary work, *Dante's Inferno* and engaged in conversations about Jamaican and Caribbean life and efforts to provide relief for those most affected by hurricane Melissa in western Jamaica.

The Institute has been most fortunate to do a recording of Africa Caribbean Conversations with Professor Goodison by UWITV. Professor Lorna Goodison has received several national, regional and international honours, including The Musgrave Gold Medal (Institute of Jamaica); The Commonwealth Poetry Prize for the Americas; First Writer-in-Residence, University of the West Indies, Mona Campus, Jamaica; Poet Laureate of Jamaica, 2017-2020; The Windham-Campbell Literature Prize for Poetry, Yale University; the British Columbia National Award for Canadian Non-Fiction for *From Harvey River: A Memoir of My Mother and Her People* . She is also the recipient of an Order of Distinction, Commander Class from the Government of Jamaica in 2013.

Presently, she is Professor Emerita from the University of Michigan, where she was the Lemuel A. Johnson Professor of English and African and Afro-American Studies.

Sierra Leone's Minister of Tourism and Cultural Affairs visits INAFRICARA

On February 4th, 2026, Sierra Leone's Minister of Tourism and Cultural Affairs, Nabeela Tunis visited INAFRICARA with Professor Rosalea Hamilton, Sierra Leone's Honorary Consul to Jamaica and a Distinguished Scholar of INAFRICARA.

The visit served two functions, firstly, a visit to the Office of the Statesman-in-Residence, The Most Honourable PJ Patterson and secondly, to discuss avenues for greater collaboration and corporation, particularly in the areas of cultural expressions and tourism. It was underscored that the Caribbean, specifically Jamaica has a long shared direct history with Sierra Leone in relation to the Maroons that must be watered with intentional efforts aimed at working together.

The Minister, expressed her appreciation for the Jamaican international artistes and cultural ambassadors who participated in the One Nation Reggae Festival, held in Sierra Leone, November 2025 that featured Reggae stars Queen Ifreka, Sizzla, Christopher Martin, among other noted Jamaican personalities. She sees reggae music as a strong unifying force and an avenue for greater integration between the two regions. The festival is slated to be an annual event and is a platform for strengthening relations between Sierra Leone and Jamaica.

Other avenues looked at for collaboration include cultural and knowledge exchanges between universities, particularly faculties and students, where people to people exchange can be significantly materialised, and economic trade. The significant problem that both Sierra Leone and INAFRICARA are committed to addressing is transportation between the two regions, which has been a major hindrance to collaboration and corporation between Africa and the Caribbean.

Participating in the Second Annual Africa in Transition Conference

“Africa in Transition: Fostering a Future of Innovation and Prosperity Driven by the Spirit of Global Africa”

Professor Paulette A. Ramsay, Research Fellow at The PJ Patterson Institute for Africa Caribbean Advocacy (INAFRICA) represented The Institute and presented at the Second Africa in Transition Conference that took place at The University of Ghana, Accra. She presented on the topic “Africa in Transition: Fostering a Future of Innovation and Prosperity Driven by the Spirit of Global Africa,” that highlighted the major political, economic, and social transformations currently shaping Africa.

Her address emphasised the key developments such as electoral reforms and improved governance in states such as Ghana that consistently exercise civic participation, gender inclusiveness and democratic processes. An important part of her address focused on the strident economic diversification taking place across continental Africa, where technology, including AI, tourism and other industries are pursued. Nigeria was cited as one country where technology, agriculture, and renewable energy sectors are being developed.

The African Export-Import Bank is noted as critical driver of economic growth and innovation with a vision to transform Africa’s economics through access to finance that will enable African countries to overcome the geopolitical challenged that they are traditionally faced with. Her presentation also stressed the importance of a just and equitable approach, as well as the continent’s youthful population as a major catalyst for future innovation and development.

Central to the discussion is the concept of “Global Africa,” which calls for stronger collaboration between Africa and its diaspora, including partnerships between the African Union and CARICOM. This includes a shared commitment to reparative justice and the creation of a transcontinental framework to advance economic, political, and social progress.

Overall, her address advocated for unity across Africa and the diaspora to harness these transitions for sustainable development, global equity, and collective prosperity.

**Topic: "What Can African Philosophy Do for the Caribbean?:

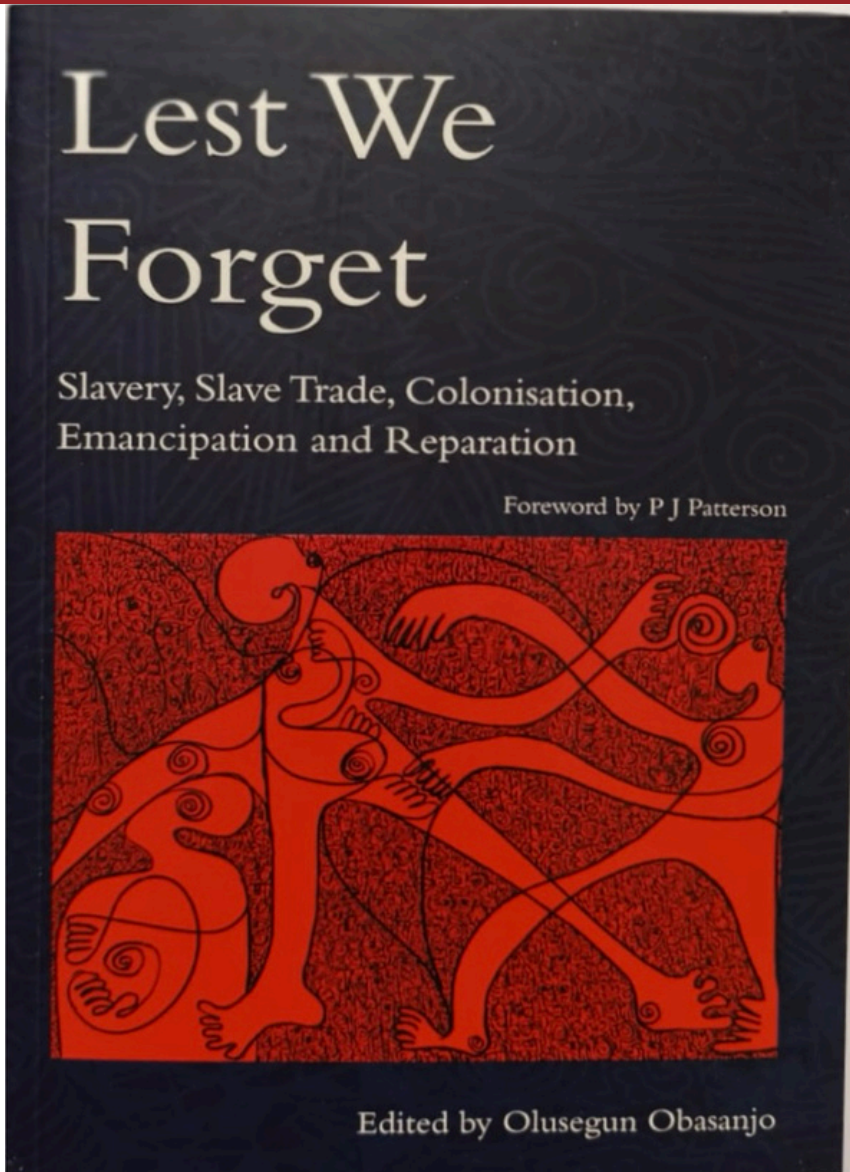

Remembrance

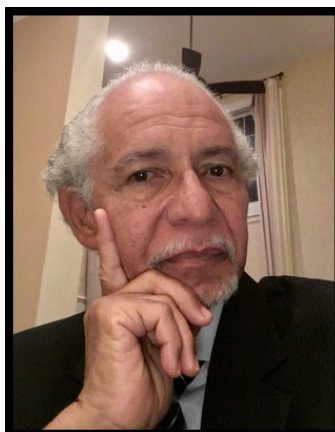
